ORDER REVOKING CONDITONS

By Order 86-2-23, served February 13, 1986, the Department imposed conditions on the authority held by U.S. and foreign air carriers that prohibited certain transactions relating to transportation to and from Libya. The Department issued the order to carry out Executive Order 12543, which had directed the imposition of certain economic sanctions against Libya. As part of a phased process, these prohibitions have gradually been reduced, most recently by Order 2004-8-5.

By Executive Order 13357, 69 Fed. Reg. 56665 (September 21, 2004) the President has terminated the emergency declared in Executive Order 12543 and has revoked that Order and related Executive Orders. To implement Executive Order 13357, the Department is now revoking Order 86-2-23 in its entirety, thus lifting the prohibitions still remaining under Order 2004-8-5. Our action does not affect any regulatory restrictions or requirements that may be maintained by other agencies, including the Departments of State, Treasury, Commerce, and Homeland Security.

ACCORDINGLY,

1. We revoke Order 86-2-23;
2. This order shall be effective upon issuance; and
3. We will serve a copy of this order upon all U.S. and foreign air carriers holding certificates of public convenience and necessity, foreign air carrier permits, or exemption authority, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Department of State.
